The Whitecoats are Coming

11 June, 1809 A fictitious *Grande Armée* scenario by Sam Mustafa

Austria's war effort in 1809 was compromised by an unrealistic grand-strategic ambition to recover everything lost since the first defeats against revolutionary France. Thus the main campaign in the Danube valley was 'supplemented' by subsidiary thrusts in Northern Italy, Dalmatia, and southern Poland. This latter campaign, entrusted to the Archduke Ferdinand, was woefully understrength for its theoretical task: the neutralizing of France's new Polish puppet state, the Grand-Duchy of Warsaw, while simultaneously guarding against any Russian moves.

The Russians were the wild-card in the calculations of both sides in 1809. Although technically allied to France and thus obligated to assist the French war effort, the Russian leadership had grown deeply mistrustful of Napoleon's ambitions and methods, and were particularly keen to make sure that Poland did not become a theatre of war that involved major French forces. Thus an Austrian army occupied the south-eastern extremities of the Grand Duchy of Warsaw, Archduke Ferdinand moved North toward Warsaw, and the Poles under Poniatowski struggled to defend their new state.

Ferdinand's mission was ambiguous. Few in Vienna probably expected him to conquer the Poles. He was to neutralize them as a threat and/or cover the Austrian rear against the Russians. But what if the Austrians, fearful of a major Russian offensive, had given Ferdinand a more sizeable army, with the express mission of conquering the Grand Duchy as swiftly as possible, and thus settling the issue? And what if Napoleon's spies had served him better in March 1809, and he had sent French forces to join the Polish/Saxon defense of Warsaw?

Napoleon's most serious problem would have been establishing a command structure. Each of the three nationalities would have wanted to take charge of Poland's defense. (And on top of this, the two highest ranking Polish commanders would not speak to each other.) Poniatowski, though only a general, would have given up his command to a French Marshal with the greatest reluctance, as the campaign was a matter of life and death for his Poles. The Saxons were led by Napoleon's least reliable and most cantankerous Marshal, Jean-Baptiste Bernadotte, who would have demanded the supreme command and would certainly not have taken orders from a Polish general. Bernadotte was already furious with Poniatowski for having countermanded his orders to withdraw a brigade of Saxon infantry from Poland. The French forces would have come from either Lannes' I Corps or Masséna's IV Corps — both fine commanders, but each with his own issues. Lannes had never commanded an independent army before, Masséna felt that he outranked the other Marshals, and neither man could stand Bernadotte. Of the two, Napoleon would have more likely entrusted Masséna with an independent command.

Thus the traditional French advantage over the Austrians — a more efficient command structure — will not exist in this scenario. For this battle we assume that Ferdinand's reinforced Austrians advance north against a divided and bickering French/Polish/Saxon army. The fate of Poland hangs in the balance.

Making life interesting (i.e., difficult) for the French commander:

The French army list has no army or Force commanders listed. This is because the French player must make a decision before the game regarding how he will distribute the command of his Forces. He has three choices, listed below, the third of which will affect not only his command structure but also his order of battle:


 If Masséna gets the command, then Bernadotte is miffed: Masséna (Good)
 Bernadotte 5 / 11" Cautious commands the IX Corps
 Poniatowski (V) 3 / 12" commands the Polish Corps
 Carra St. Cyr 4 / 12" Cautious commands the IV Corps

2. If Bernadotte gets the command, Masséna is miffed and Poniatowski demands action: Bernadotte (Poor)
Poniatowski (V) 4/12" Aggressive commands the Polish Corps
Masséna 5/18" commands the IV Corps
Revnier 3/16" commands the IX Corps

3. If Poniatowski gets the command, no French Marshal will serve under him. Napoleon sends a makeshift French corps under his ADC Jean Rapp. The Saxons, under Reynier, are hamstrung by Bernadotte's interference. (French and Saxon units marked with an asterisk (*) are not used for this option.)
Poniatowski (Good)
Knaiszewicz (V) 2 / 8" commands the Polish Corps
Rapp (V) 2 / 15" commands the IV Corps
Reynier 3 / 14" commands the IX Corps

Set-up and Reinforcement:

The Austrians set up first, wherever they like in their deployment area. Then the Polish Corps, Cavalry Corps, and Saxons set up as marked on the map. At the end of each turn, check for the arrival of the French IV Corps. Subtract the turn number just completed from the corps commander's control number. Roll one die. If the roll is *greater* than the total, the French IV enters at point X on the first pulse of the next turn. (*Example:* St. Cyr commands the IV Corps, with a control number of 4. At the end of Turn 1, subtract one, meaning that the player must roll greater than 3 to enter the corps next turn. Failing that, he'll have to roll greater than 2 (control number 4 minus turn 2) at the end of the next turn, and so on.)



The Scenario:

The weather is chosen at random, and variable. The ground starts hard, even if the weather starts as rain. Roll for Basic Length. The morale of both armies is "Confident." Calculate army morale as normal.

The two towns are hard cover and each has one bridge. The woods are Rough terrain. The rivers are both fordable by infantry and cavalry (and officers), as Rough terrain. The two-level hill offers a vantage point.
